How does \$1,639/month sound for HOA dues?

Every now and again, our HOA has a vote. In November, it was to vote on what our monthly HOA fees would be for 2026. Would it be \$469 per month or would it be \$1,639 per month?

Did you vote to have your voice heard? If so, thank you!

If not, you may want to know that we were only **1** vote away from our dues being \$1,639 per month every month in 2026. That's right, one vote was the difference of paying an extra \$1,100+ per month for the same services. As a yearly cost it's the difference between paying \$5,628 or \$19,668.

We know the voting process can be challenging. If you don't understand the material you receive, please contact any board member or the office for assistance. We won't tell you how to vote, but we will help you understand what you're voting for or what you're not voting for.

If you cannot deliver your ballot to a ballot box, please let a board member know and we can pick it up and make sure it gets to the right place so your voice is heard.

BTW, in order to pass a motion, we need a minimum number of "yes" votes; so unfortunately not voting isn't neutral - it's the equivalent of voting "no" which would have caused the higher HOA fee. Every vote matters!

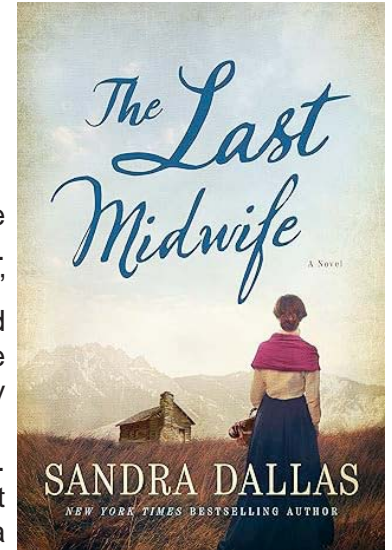

With her friends taking sides and a trial looming, Gracy must decide whether it's worth risking everything to prove her innocence.

Originally this Ad was a front and back flyer with space for a realtor stamp. It was inserted into the larger Mainland's brochure along with flyers for other models.

This is the initial advertisement for the Essex, later called the Eden Model. Notice the price. In less than a year by the end of 1969, it had risen to \$19,900 from the initial \$17,990. Also notice the size of the screen porch. The drawing says 11 x 20 ft., but the additions copy says it is 12 x 29 ft. Talk to your friends who have an Eden, the width of this room seems to vary. Some are 11 feet wide and others are 12 feet or even 12.5 feet wide.

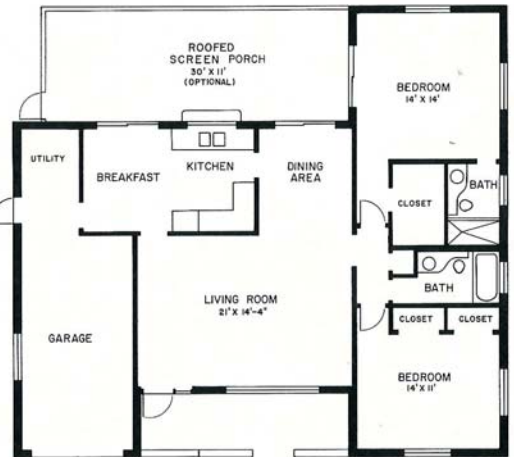

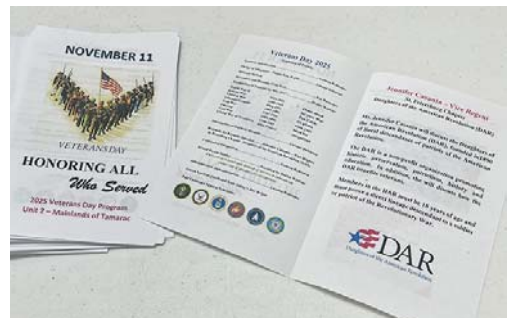


Wreaths Across America is a major DAR project. Whereas wreaths are laid at our Military Cemeteries in December to honor and remember our veterans that are no longer with us.

I would like to thank the generosity of our residents who were in the audience. The donations gave the students gas money. Unit 2's donation provided the school with funds to help the band with expenses during the year.

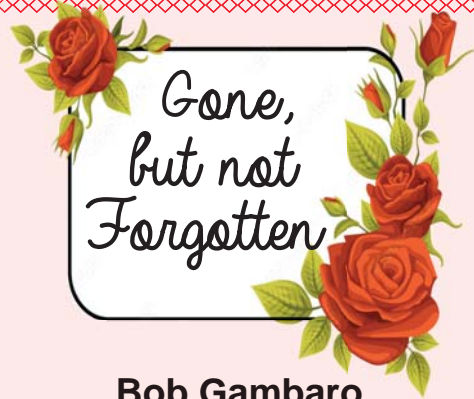
